




Benefits of NHCORR Certification

- Training and education for both operators & house leaders
- → Belonging to a community of recovery residence operators in New Hampshire and nationally
- → Updates on best practices and standards
- → Access to impartial complaint & mediation process
- → Connection to the National Alliance for Recovery Residences (NARR)

Overview of the Certification Process




NHCORR conducts its formal verification
visit which includes a walk through of your
home, and a formal interview with house
leadership & residents.

When your home meets all required
standards, NHCORR will officially certify
your recovery residence for a term of
one year.


Overview of NARR's Recovery Residence Levels of Support

Before becoming certified, NHCORR will help your home determine what level of support your home provides.



The level of support in which you certify will also determine types of documentation required for certification.


NHCORR Certification Resources



The NHCORR Recovery Housing Operator's Manual contains over 31 standards proven by documentation, attestation, deferments, and visual & discussion verification.


Those seeking certification through NHCORR will be provided with digital copies of these documents to reference during the certification process.

They can be found in your Certemy Account.




Our Certification Workbook contains a comprehensive overview of our certification process, including a glossary of terms, checklists and a list of required documentation.

Creating an Account via Certemy

click on "To begin the certification process, click here" and create your account* by completing Certemy's registration.



After creating your account, you will have access to a credential called "Agreement & Introductory Visit" - here you will enter basic information, review some materials, and pay your application fee.

Note: Select the tab on the top of the screen called "My Credentials".

^{*}Accounts are limited to one user per home. This would generally be the house operator.

Introductory Visit

- → NHCORR will visit your recovery home and discuss the certification process with you.
- NHCORR will assist you in determining the level of certification (I, II, III, or IV) your home falls within.
- → All materials relevant to certification including the NHCORR Recovery Housing Operator's Manual and Certification Workbook will be discussed.
- → We will also take a quick tour of your recovery home and discuss any glaring obstacles that could present a challenge to your certification.




Email Your Documents for Review


- → Email all of the documents you currently use to the Certification Team Leader for an initial review. We will carefully review those documents, let you know what's missing and suggest areas needing revision to meet the NARR standards.
- → This is an open conversation. Recovery house documents should not only reflect the recovery house but also incorporate best practices in recovery housing.
- → Once all documents are reviewed and appear ready for approval, they will be returned to you electronically for uploading into Certemy.

Certification Materials Uploaded & Reviewed

- → After being assigned the NHCORR Certification credential, you will be able to upload your house documents to their respective categories, including corporate documents, management documents, and resident documents.
- → You will also execute an Affidavit of Acknowledgments, complete a Deferments Checklist, and complete a Verification Visit Request.



Verification Visit




- → NHCORR will visit your recovery home for a final onsite verification visit
- → NHCORR will ensure your home is meeting standards both through a comprehensive discussion with yourself, house leaders and residents, and a walkthrough of your home.
 - During the discussion, we will be looking to prove both the Social Model of Recovery & your certified policies are being lived out.
 - During the walkthrough, we will be looking to prove you have a home-like setting that promotes the Social Model, home & fire safety, adequate space in bedrooms, adequate bathroom capacity.

Certification Approval



- → Once all proof that your home meets the NARR Standard has been compiled, reviewed, verified, and approved, NHCORR will officially certify your home.
- → Your final product of certification is your Certification Portfolio - found in your digital wallet in Certemy
- → You will receive both a digital and physical Certificate of Certification, and a Digital Badge for your website.






Certification Approval (cont.)

→ Certification is valid for one year from the point of certification.

- → NHCORR expects certified homes to keep their Certification Portfolio current by notifying NHCORR of any changes in documentation as they occur.
- → Certemy will automatically remind you as the date of recertification approaches to review all your documents and verify that they still meet NARR standards.
 - When your initial certification credential has been approved, your credential will automatically enter the "renewal phase".
- The recertification process will be very similar to initial certification.
